Question # 1

Please explain how do you manage stress?

Answer:-

I try not to get stressed out. Timelines will do it but when I do have a time crunch. I always try to take a step back, relax, take a look at the big picture before I come up with a plan of action.

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Question # 2

What are your strengths as Aviation Analyst?

Answer:-

I have great skill in using various types of pneumatic tools, electric tools and hand tools. I have excellent knowledge and skill in reading and interpreting blue prints technical documents and specifications. I have many years of experience in fabrication, production assembly and installation. I have gained excellent learning experience both theoretical and practical in the aerospace industry.

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Question # 3

Do you know what types of jobs are available for recent graduates?

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Question # 5

This is another question looking towards job commitment. Some people go through jobs like socks because they don't have a life plan, and your answer can show insight into this. It can also be used for finding out if you are the type that sets goals at all in life, because those that make long-term goals are usually more reliable. Also, your goals can provide insight on your personality too.

You should respond with an answer that shows progression in your career is on track with your route in the company. It's important to do your research on company prospects, this way you understand what to expect and if it's in your long-term goal. Interviewers don't want to set you on a path that won't provide the results you want, resulting in you resigning.

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Question # 6

Are you applying for other airlines?

Answer:-

Although I have applied for other airlines - this is the airline I want to work for most as it has a professional image and I always hear positive comments about the airline, so it would definitely be a great place for me to start as cabin crew.



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Question # 7

What did you dislike about your old job?

Answer:-

Try to avoid any pin point, like never say "I did not like my manager or I did not like environment or I did not like team" Never use negative terminology. Try to keep focus on every thing was good, I just wanted to make change for proper growth.

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Question # 8

Tell us something about your current job responsibilities?

Answer:-

As I am a fresher just passed out my graduation so still I don't have any work experience but I only want is a chance to prove myself. All the above information about questions have been given by recently hired cabin crew

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Question # 9

Explain me why do you believe we should hire you?

Answer:-

This question needs to be carefully answered as it is your opportunity to stick out from the rest of the applicants. You should focus on skills that you have, including those not yet mentioned. Simply responding:
"Most people say I'm the best Airline Ground Staffer they know"

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Question # 10

Tell me what do you expect candidates to know about the company before an interview?

Answer:-

We expect them to know who we are and what we do. What are our financial drivers? In what way do we serve our customers? That sounds easy, but many people don't take that couple of hours of research, and it makes the difference. We're talking about your career; why wouldn't you go the extra mile?

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Question # 11

How do you deal with conflict in the workplace?

Answer:-

Yes. I was contracted to Iraq with the army installing ABS (anti lock brake system) for 80 900 series 5 ton trucks and had a two week minimum to accomplish the goal. I finished the task in a week and a half with inspection passing and army buy offs.

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Question # 12

Explain me about a time when someone gave you difficult feedback. How did you handle it?

Answer:-

The most difficult had back I would say is when a customer ask me to drop him off at the stop light because he forgot his phone and wanted to return and come back with me. But when I came up with a better option he was happy for the my action.

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Question # 13

Tell me what makes you qualified for this role?

Answer:-

You should hire me because, I am a dedicated worker, punctual, work well with others, or as a individual, and my past experience in construction will be beneficial for this position.

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Question # 14

Tell me how have you made an impact on your team in the past?

Answer:-

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Question # 15

Do you know what are the requirements for the internship program?

Answer:-



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The application window opens in January, and we hire 20 to 30 interns for the summer. The vast majority of our interns are based in our New York headquarters as well as our operations offices in Salt Lake City, Utah, and Orlando, Florida. The internships can be 90 days to 12 months. These are not administrative roles. They are doing project work, and they are paid for their time.

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Question # 16

What are your salary expectations as Aviation Analyst?

Answer:-

This question is like a loaded gun, tricky and dangerous if you're not sure what you are doing. It's not uncommon for people to end up talking salary before really selling their skills, but knowledge is power as this is a negotiation after all. Again, this is an area where doing your research will be helpful as you will have an understanding of average salary.

One approach is asking the interviewer about the salary range, but to avoid the question entirely, you can respond that money isn't a key factor and your goal is to advance in your career. However, if you have a minimum figure in mind and you believe you're able to get it, you may find it worth trying.

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Question # 17

Can you give us an example of when you have provided excellent customer service?

Answer:-

Long time ago in a restaurant, the lady didn't know what to eat for dessert, so I described each dish to her and she was trying to decide between two so I asked the chef if it was ok for her to have a small piece of each - she was very happy with that !

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Question # 18

Would you like doing repetitive work?

Answer:-

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Question # 19

Tell me how would you deal with being away from your friends and family for long periods of time when working as cabin crew?

Answer:-

I know it is not so easy to go away from my friends and family but I understand that it is necessary for the job. And also it is a good have some time away and learn new things.

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Question # 20

Tell me what particular experience do you have being an Airline Ground Staff Crew Member?

Answer:-

Speak about specifics that relate to the position you are applying for. If you do not have specific experience, get as close as you can (ie: related airline, customer service, or technical experience).

If you are being asked this question from your employer then feel free to fully explain your experience. Tell the employer what responsibilities you were performing during your previous job.

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Question # 21

Tell me what are some ways you have worked to improve yourself over the past month?

Answer:-

I would like to expand my knowledge in the field of electrical installation applications to that of the aerospace industry rather than just general automotive. Specifically speaking, aircraft. It is my hope that within the next five years I will find myself working in the cockpit of airliners as a mechanic who installs aircraft flight instrumentation, and control assemblies.

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Question # 22

Explain me about a time when you reached a goal within a tight deadline?

Answer:-

I work well under pressure to meet deadlines without jeopardizing the quality of my work. I have always worked in a fast pace environment where we are constantly under pressure to achieve best results within a time frame.

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Question # 23

Do you know what types of jobs do you offer that some might find surprising for an airline?

Answer:-

We really are a technology company at our core, which might seem surprising to some. Some examples of roles in that area are engineers, graphic designers, and



digital marketing strategists. We also hire a lot of revenue analysts right out of college. These are the people who analyze the rise and fall of the stock market, and determine air travel prices based on that. It's a nuanced skill, and it offers young people a lot of growth. We almost always have a need in that department because people are promoted very quickly. They learn many skills on the job and find different opportunities within the company.

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Question # 24

What do you consider to be your biggest weakness as Aviation Analyst?

Answer:-

This can be a tricky question to respond to, if you suggest you have no weaknesses you're going to appear as a liar or egotistical. You should respond realistically by mentioning small work related weaknesses. Although many try to answer using a positive skill in disguise as a weakness, like "I expect co-workers to have the same commitment" or "I am a perfectionist". However, it is recommended that there is some honesty and the weaknesses are true, and then emphasize on how you have overcome it or working to improve it. The purpose of this question is to see how you view and evaluate yourself.

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Question # 25

What do you think about Teamwork?

Answer:-

I enjoy teamwork and am used to shift work. I think I would adapt well to the role. I am looking for new challenges and I know I would learn a lot as cabin crew, not just about people and places, but skills like first aid too, how can I help others with in my limits.

You should do your research prior to the interview. Look into background history of the company, this will help you stick out. Learn about main people, have they been in the news lately? The interviewer doesn't expect you to know dates and certain people, but showing that you have enough interest to research the company is a positive impression.

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Question # 33

Why are you leaving last job?

Answer:-

Although this would seem like a simple question, it can easily become tricky. You shouldn't mention salary being a factor at this point. If you're currently employed, your response can focus on developing and expanding your career and even yourself. If you're current employer is downsizing, remain positive and brief. If your employer fired you, prepare a solid reason. Under no circumstance should you discuss any drama or negativity, always remain positive.

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Question # 34

Why should we employ you as cabin crew at XYZ Airlines?

Answer:-

The airline has ordered many new aircraft and is progressing well. So I want to be part of that and also one of my friends worked for you and recommended me to apply as she thought I would fit in with the company ideals.



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Question # 35

Explain me a time when you had to quickly adapt to a change at work?

Answer:-

When I worked at Dorchester County DSS, the staff had low morale and poor leadership. I had conversations with several supervisors and others, to try and figure out how we could improve.

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Question # 36

Explain me about your experience working in this field?

Answer:-

I am dedicated, hardworking and great team player for the common goal of the company I work with. I am fast learner and quickly adapt to fast pace and dynamic area. I am well organized, detail oriented and punctual person.

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Question # 37

Tell me what do you consider to be your best strength as Aviation Analyst?

Answer:-

This question allows you to brag on yourself, but keep in mind that the interviewer wants strengths relative to the position. For example, being a problem solver, a motivator, and being able to perform under pressure, positive attitude and loyal. You will also need examples that back your answers up for illustration of the skill.

Tell me what does success mean to you?
