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# TTC (Toronto Transit Commission) Job Interview Preparation Guide.

## Question # 1

What five words would describe you as TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

### Answer:-

The hiring manager requests this of you because she wants to know more about your individual personality. This list can reveal a lot to her about who you are and how you might fit into the workplace. Your answer also gives the manager an indication of your self-perception, which is a good indicator of the type of employee you will be.

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## Question # 2

Do you consider yourself successful?

### Answer:-

You should always answer yes to this question. Briefly explain why without going on and on. If you communicate that you're more successful than you really are you may come off as arrogant or unrealistic. A good explanation is that you have set professional goals and that you have met some of these goals and are on track to meet more in the near future.

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## Question # 3

Give me an example of a time when you set a goal and were able to meet or achieve it?

### Answer:-

Show that you set great goals and the process and steps you took to achieve it. Details really matter here.

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## Question # 4

What have you learned from mistakes on the job?

### Answer:-

Candidates without specific examples often do not seem credible. However, the example shared should be fairly inconsequential, unintentional, and a learned lesson should be gleaned from it. Moving ahead without group assistance while assigned to a group project meant to be collaborative is a good example.

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## Question # 5

How do you evaluate success In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

### Answer:-

I evaluate success In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission) in different ways. At work, it is meeting the goals set by my supervisors and my fellow workers. It is my understanding, from talking to other employees, that the Global Guideline company is recognized for not only rewarding success but giving employees opportunity to grow as well.

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## Question # 6

Do you know anyone working with this organization?

### Answer:-

It would be great if you did - then you could potentially use them as a referral if they thought highly of you.

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### **Question # 7**

What is your philosophy towards work?

#### **Answer:-**

This is typically a straightforward question that merits a straightforward answer. Do you have strong work ethic? Will you do whatever it takes to make sure the job gets done? Just say so in your response. Keep it short, direct and positive.

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### **Question # 8**

How do you propose to compensate for your lack of experience?

#### **Answer:-**

The first thing you should do is discuss experience you have the interviewer is unfamiliar with. Once that is detailed, tell the person conducting the interview that you are able to learn new tasks and information in a reasonable period of time and possess a strong work ethic. However, only state this if you can live up to these expectations.

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### **Question # 9**

Give me an example of how you handled pressure at work In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

#### **Answer:-**

The company is looking to see if you can handle pressure well. Share with them an example where you were able to stay calm during a pressure filled situation (perhaps it was a deadline, or there was an emergency with a customer occurring). Discuss the situation, your reaction and steps you took to resolve it and the outcome.

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### **Question # 10**

What is your greatest strength In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

#### **Answer:-**

This is your time to shine. Just remember the interviewer is looking for work related strengths In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission). Mention a number of them such as being a good motivator, problem solver, performing well under pressure, being loyal, having a positive attitude, eager to learn, taking initiative, and attention to detail. Whichever you go for, be prepared to give examples that illustrate this particular skill.

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### **Question # 11**

Tell me about a time when you had to use your presentation skills to influence someone's opinion In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

#### **Answer:-**

Example stories could be a class project, an internal meeting presentation, or a customer facing presentation.

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### **Question # 12**

What position do you prefer on a team working on a project?

#### **Answer:-**

Do not claim to be comfortable with a specific role if you in are in fact not comfortable with it. However, if you have no problem working in certain roles or situations, be sure to discuss this with the interviewer.

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### **Question # 13**

What are your greatest professional strengths In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

#### **Answer:-**

When answering this question, we recommends being accurate (share your true strengths, not those you think the interviewer wants to hear); relevant (choose your strengths that are most targeted to this particular position In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)); and specific (for example, instead of "people skills," choose "persuasive communication" or "relationship building"). Then, follow up with an example of how you've demonstrated these traits in a professional setting.

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### **Question # 14**

What's your dream job?

#### **Answer:-**

Along similar lines, the interviewer wants to uncover whether this position In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission) is really in line with your ultimate career goals. While "an GGL star" might get you a few laughs, a better bet is to talk about your goals and ambitions-and why this job will get you closer to them.

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### **Question # 15**

What is more important to you money or success?

#### **Answer:-**

First ask yourself that question before the interview - what are your priorities? Are money and success actual one in the same goal for you? If not, what's more



important based on how do you define success?

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### **Question # 16**

How have you made an impact on your team in the past?

**Answer:-**

I would explain and show to him or her best way possible and if they have a better way then I will encourage him or her to let me know then we can see if it works or not In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission).

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### **Question # 17**

What do you ultimately want to become?

**Answer:-**

Do you want to be an entry level worker In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)? Do you want to be a leader? Do you want to be an entrepreneur? Do you want to be a philanthropist? Do you want to be in middle management? Ask yourself these questions to figure it out.

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### **Question # 18**

Tell me a difficult situation you have overcome in the workplace?

**Answer:-**

Conflict resolution, problem solving, communication and coping under pressure are transferable skills desired by many employers In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission).

Answering this question right can help you demonstrate all of these traits.

\* Use real-life examples from your previous roles that you are comfortable explaining

\* Choose an example that demonstrates the role you played in resolving the situation clearly

\* Remain professional at all times - you need to demonstrate that you can keep a cool head and know how to communicate with people

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### **Question # 19**

If you felt like you were hitting the proverbial "wall" and getting burned out, what would you do to re-energize yourself?

**Answer:-**

Take a break to rest. Work in smaller increments of time to increase focus with breaks in between. Delegate tasks to those that are willing to help.

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### **Question # 20**

If you were given more initiatives than you could handle, what would you do?

**Answer:-**

First prioritize the important activities that impact the business most. Then discuss the issue of having too many initiatives with the boss so that it can be offloaded. Work harder to get the initiatives done.

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### **Question # 21**

What relevant work experience do you have in this career field In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

**Answer:-**

Talk about specific work related experience for the position you're interviewing for. Make sure the experience is relevant. Don't talk about previous experience that is not related to the position in question. If you don't have specific career related experience speak about prior experience that has helped you develop the specific knowledge and skills required for the position you are applying for.

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### **Question # 22**

Why did you select the University \_\_\_\_\_?

**Answer:-**

Discuss the academic program, the extracurricular program(s), the school spirit, the quality of your peers, and the professors.

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### **Question # 23**

Tell me about a difficult decision you've made in the last year In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

**Answer:-**

We all have difficult decisions in our lives. Show how you were able to arrive at it and then how you decisively acted.

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### **Question # 24**

Top 17 Behavioral Interview Questions In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission):



### **Answer:-**

Behavioral interviews In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission) where popularized by industrial psychologists in the 1970s, and have been used at big companies like AT&T. The idea behind them is that past responses to situations are the best predictor of how candidates will respond in the future.

1. Tell me about a time you faced a conflict while working as part of a team.
2. Talk about a goal you set for yourself. What did you do to make sure you met the goal?
3. Give an example of a time when you had to work with someone with a very different personality from yours.
4. Talk about an instance where you wish you'd handled a situation differently with a team member.
5. What's the most difficult problem you have had to solve In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?
6. Give an example of how you handled a situation where you needed information from a colleague who wasn't responsive.
7. Talk about a time when you had problems building a relationship with a key team member. What did you do?
8. Tell me about an instance when it was important to make a great impression on a client. What did you do?
9. Tell me about a situation where you had to work with a difficult client.
10. Tell me about a situation where you disappointed a client, and how you tried to fix it.
11. Talk about a time when you had to strategize to meet all your obligations.
12. Talk about a time when you failed at something. How did you react?
13. Talk about a time you took on a leadership role.
14. Tell me about a long-term project you oversaw. How did you keep it focused and on schedule?
15. Talk about a time when you were under a lot of stress. What caused it, and how did you manage?
16. Do you prefer to work alone or with others In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?
17. Tell me about a time when you were overwhelmed by the amount of work on your agenda. How did you handle it?

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### **Question # 25**

What are your strengths In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

### **Answer:-**

This is one of the most common questions you will be asked. Give an answer relevant to the skills and qualities relevant to the position you are applying to. The interviewer is trying to find if your strengths match the job. For example, if you are applying for a job In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission) where accuracy is an important issue, one of your strengths could be that you have an eye for detail. It may useful to find different words to describe similar attributes and qualities in order to avoid repetition.

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### **Question # 26**

How articulate are you in expressing your ideas?

### **Answer:-**

One of the best ways to answer this question is clearly articulate three points that demonstrate how articulate you are (and in a sense show that in a live setting) - for example: "I would say I'm articulate because one, I typically gather my thoughts before speaking, two, I organize my thoughts well, and three I'm concise when making a point.

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### **Question # 27**

What role do you see technology playing in this role?

### **Answer:-**

Technology is important to almost every job today but it's not meant to be abused. I believe it's important to increase productivity and not for personal use.

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### **Question # 28**

How do you deal with conflict in the workplace In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

### **Answer:-**

When people work together, conflict is often unavoidable because of differences in work goals and personal styles. Follow these guidelines for handling conflict in the workplace.

- \* 1. Talk with the other person.
- \* 2. Focus on behavior and events, not on personalities.
- \* 3. Listen carefully.
- \* 4. Identify points of agreement and disagreement.
- \* 5. Prioritize the areas of conflict.
- \* 6. Develop a plan to work on each conflict.
- \* 7. Follow through on your plan.
- \* 8. Build on your success.

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### **Question # 29**

What do you know about this company?

### **Answer:-**

Research the company on Google by searching recent news (to remain current on them) and their website. Make sure you understand their products / services, vision, competitive differentiators, and work culture.

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### **Question # 30**

How do you handle your anger?



**Answer:-**

I don't get angry very easily but in the rare occasion that I do, I hold it in and act as though nothing is wrong.

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**Question # 31**

How important is a positive attitude to you?

**Answer:-**

Incredibly important. I believe a positive attitude is the foundation of being successful - it's contagious in the workplace, with our customers, and ultimately it's the difference maker.

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**Question # 32**

What are three positive characteristics you wish you had?

**Answer:-**

The key here is to be honest about your wish list but then to describe how you plan on developing or growing those characteristics so that it becomes a reality. For example, I wish I had a stronger work ethic and I am reading a book right now about how to instill a better discipline around getting work done efficiently.

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**Question # 33**

Describe a time where you've failed and bounced back?

**Answer:-**

Share a story to describe this. For example: "I accidentally made the mistake of telling a customer I could deliver on a solution set on a certain date and then later found out our business partner couldn't do it on that time. I learned that I shouldn't rush into important decisions and promises like this and that I should always check with my counterparts first before committing to a statement of work."

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**Question # 34**

What other jobs are you applying for In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

**Answer:-**

If you're applying with other similar companies in a similar or the same industry, it's actually okay to state that as it shows you're valued and wanted.

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**Question # 35**

How do you inspire others to be better?

**Answer:-**

First, the key to inspiring others is to first understand what their goals and objectives are. Once you understand what people want, you can inspire them with a vision that aligns to what they care about. People generally care about having purpose, being successful (and being recognized for it), contributing in a meaningful way, and financial rewards (to a degree) and much more. Then once you understand what people set as goals, you can inspire them through 1:1 pep talks, a presentation to multiple people and so forth.

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**Question # 36**

What qualities do you believe are important to have as a manager?

**Answer:-**

Great managers tend to empower their employees to be successful through strong coaching. They understand how to manage relationships - this is commonly referred to as emotional intelligence. They have to be able to handle both client and staff situations that require them to be calm under pressure to clearly think of solutions to complex problems. Most importantly they must be able to articulate the vision to the team and inspire them to work together to collectively achieve that goal

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**Question # 37**

How meticulous are you with details?

**Answer:-**

Being detailed is important for many types of job roles. Typically you want to highlight how you've done that in previous roles. Example: "Being meticulous is important to me. In my last job, I had to count the money in the register as a cashier to make sure it matched to the receipts down to the last penny." This was to ensure there wasn't any "wrongdoing" at the company by any of the cashiers and I was always accurate in my reports.

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**Question # 38**

What is your ideal working environment?

**Answer:-**

Describe your ideal working environment. Do you like flexibility with work hours? Do you like working in a cubicle or independently? Do you like to be micro managed or empowered? Do you like to work on your own or in a team? Do you like being driven by metrics in your role? How much responsibility do you want?

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### **Question # 39**

How do you feel about this company's vision?

#### **Answer:-**

First find out where the company envisions itself in 3-5 years. If you can't find the vision of the company, that's probably a big question mark on the company itself. Once you do, identify how those company's visions align to your personal values and goals and then articulate how tightly correlated that is to the interviewer. For example - this company wants to be the #1 provider of green technology in the world and I feel strongly about that vision because we've got a chance to collectively impact the world to become a greener society and save our clients at the same time!

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### **Question # 40**

Do you have the ability to articulate a vision and to get others involved to carry it out?

#### **Answer:-**

If yes, then share an example of how you've done so at work or college. If not, then discuss how you would do so. Example: "I would first understand the goals of the staff members and then I would align those to the goals of the project / company. Then I would articulate the vision of that alignment and ask them to participate. From there, we would delegate tasks among the team and then follow up on a date and time to ensure follow through on the tasks. Lastly, we would review the results together."

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### **Question # 41**

What is the most important quality a supervisor should have?

#### **Answer:-**

The ability to inspire / lead a team towards one common vision.

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### **Question # 42**

How do you feel about giving back to the community?

#### **Answer:-**

Describe your charitable activities to showcase that community work is important to you. If you haven't done one yet, go to [www.globalguideline.com](http://www.globalguideline.com) - charitable work is a great way to learn about other people and it's an important part of society - GET INVOLVED!

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### **Question # 43**

If you look at a clock and the time is 3:15, what's the angle between the hour and the minute hands?

#### **Answer:-**

Usually, if the answer to a brainteaser seems too easy, chances are the answer's wrong. And in this case, the answer is not zero degrees. The hour hand, remember, moves as well. That is, in addition to the minute hand. And so, at 3:15, the hour hand and the minute hand are not on top of each other. In fact, the hour hand has moved a quarter of the way between the 3 and 4. This means it's moved a quarter of 30 degrees (360 degrees divided by 12 equals 30). So the answer, to be exact, is seven and a half degrees (30 divided by four).

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### **Question # 44**

Why should we give you this job In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission) when someone else is equally qualified?

#### **Answer:-**

Describe how you're unique, but make sure you tie it to the job responsibilities and how you would impact the company. For example, "I believe my unique programming skills and experience in developing over 18 best selling iphone apps will help the company develop high quality applications faster than my competitors"

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### **Question # 45**

What makes you a good manager?

#### **Answer:-**

Describe how you manage people, time, money and energy in the most effective manner to achieve the best return of that investment.

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### **Question # 46**

What is your biggest regret to date and why?

#### **Answer:-**

Describe honestly the regretful action / situation you were in but then discuss how you proactively fixed / improved it and how that helped you to improve as a person/worker.

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### **Question # 47**

What's been your biggest failure to date?

**Answer:-**

Describe your biggest failure and discuss what you've learned from it and ideally how you've been successful since because of that lesson.

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**Question # 48**

What challenges are you looking for in this position?

**Answer:-**

A typical interview question to determine what you are looking for your in next job, and whether you would be a good fit for the position being hired for, is "What challenges are you looking for in a position In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?" The best way to answer questions about the challenges you are seeking is to discuss how you would like to be able to effectively utilize your skills and experience if you were hired for the job. You can also mention that you are motivated by challenges, have the ability to effectively meet challenges, and have the flexibility and skills necessary to handle a challenging job. You can continue by describing specific examples of challenges you have met and goals you have achieved in the past.

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**Question # 49**

Why should I hire you In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

**Answer:-**

To close the deal on a job offer, you MUST be prepared with a concise summary of the top reasons to choose you. Even if your interviewer doesn't ask one of these question in so many words, you should have an answer prepared and be looking for ways to communicate your top reasons throughout the interview process.

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**Question # 50**

How open are you to relocation?

**Answer:-**

If you're not, then say you're not. Don't lie about it just to get the job. There's no point if you won't move for the job anyway and lying is unethical. If you are open to relocation In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission), let them know which areas you'd be willing to relocate to.

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**Question # 51**

What problems have you encountered at work?

**Answer:-**

Wow, do we have problems! Where do I begin? Well, most of the problems are internal, just people not working well with each other. I have one person on our team who is a real problem, but it seems like management is afraid to do anything about it. So we all end up having to do extra work to cover for this person, who just doesn't work. We all say that he's retired in place. I think he's just holding on until retirement in a couple years. But he's a real problem. I complain about it--a lot--but nothing ever seems to get done. I've even written negative reviews about the person, hoping he will get canned, but it doesn't happen. I can't wait for him to retire.

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**Question # 52**

How do you plan to go by an example for your subordinates?

**Answer:-**

Sticking to the rules by yourself, working hard and not mind participating on basic tasks is a good answer.

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**Question # 53**

What do you know about this department?

**Answer:-**

One good way to find out about the department is to try to "informally" interview the existing employees over coffee (outside of the office) if possible. It's hard if you don't have any connections there, but if you do a great way to learn about it. Other than that, it's often hard to learn about the department so you can turn the table back on them by asking questions to learn about it.

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**Question # 54**

How do you ensure all of your work gets accomplished in a productive manner?

**Answer:-**

The key is to prioritize what's important in your work and to stay organized to accomplish the tasks. A strong work ethic also helps.

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**Question # 55**

Give me an example of an emergency situation that you faced. How did you handle it?

**Answer:-**

There was a time when one of my employers faced the quitting of a manager in another country. I was asked to go fill in for him while they found a replacement and stay to train that person. I would be at least 30 days. I quickly accepted because I knew that my department couldn't function without me.

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### **Question # 56**

What kind of salary do you need In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

#### **Answer:-**

This is a loaded question and a nasty little game that you will probably lose if you answer first. So, do not answer it. Instead, say something like, that's a tough question. Can you tell me the range for this position? In most cases, the interviewer, taken off guard, will tell you. If not, say that it can depend on the details of the job. Then give a wide range.

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### **Question # 57**

What's the most rewarding work you've ever done and why?

#### **Answer:-**

Companies love it when you discuss how you've made an impact on your teammates, clients, or partners in the business or in school. It should be rewarding because of the hard work and creative process that you've put into it.

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### **Question # 58**

Do you have any question regarding this job In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

#### **Answer:-**

Never ask Salary, perks, leave, place of posting, etc. regarded questions. Try to ask more about the company to show how early you can make a contribution to your organization like. "Sir, with your kind permission I would like to know more about induction and developmental programs?" OR Sir, I would like to have my feedback, so that I can analyze and improve my strengths and rectify my shortcomings.

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### **Question # 59**

How good are you at problem solving?

#### **Answer:-**

Describe the problem first and then discuss how you were able to fix it.

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### **Question # 60**

Do you think you have enough experience In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

#### **Answer:-**

If you do not have the experience they need, you need to show the employer that you have the skills, qualities and knowledge that will make you equal to people with experience but not necessary the skills. It is also good to add how quick you can pick up the routine of a new job role.

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### **Question # 61**

Do you like to start personal relationships with other employees?

#### **Answer:-**

Well, the right answer is yes and no. Good personal relations can improve the overall performance of a team. But on the other hand, you should not let your emotions to affect your decisions in work.

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### **Question # 62**

What would your first 30, 60, or 90 days look like in this role In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

#### **Answer:-**

Start by explaining what you'd need to do to get ramped up. What information would you need? What parts of the company would you need to familiarize yourself with? What other employees would you want to sit down with? Next, choose a couple of areas where you think you can make meaningful contributions right away. (e.g., "I think a great starter project would be diving into your email marketing campaigns and setting up a tracking system for them.") Sure, if you get the job, you (or your new employer) might decide there's a better starting place, but having an answer prepared will show the interviewer where you can add immediate impact-and that you're excited to get started.

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### **Question # 63**

What do you think is your greatest weakness?

#### **Answer:-**

Don't say anything that could eliminate you from consideration for the job. For instance, "I'm slow in adapting to change" is not a wise answer, since change is par for the course in most work environments. Avoid calling attention to any weakness that's one of the critical qualities the hiring manager is looking for. And don't try the old "I'm a workaholic," or "I'm a perfectionist."

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### **Question # 64**

What does quality work mean to you?

**Answer:-**

Quality work to be is about doing work to the require or set standard, which is very important when it comes to warehouse operations.

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**Question # 65**

How would you go about establishing your credibility quickly In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission) with the team?

**Answer:-**

Fully understand my responsibilities, work hard and exceed expectations, learn as much as possible, help others as much as possible, understand what my teammates' goals and needs are, be on time, and gain a mentor.

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**Question # 66**

Why should the we hire you as this position In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

**Answer:-**

This is the part where you link your skills, experience, education and your personality to the job itself. This is why you need to be utterly familiar with the job description as well as the company culture. Remember though, it's best to back them up with actual examples of say, how you are a good team player.

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**Question # 67**

What does "thinking outside the box" mean to you?

**Answer:-**

It means not doing things exactly the same way as everyone else. You've got to challenge the status quo and bring something new to the business.

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**Question # 68**

When was the last time something upset you at work? What did you do?

**Answer:-**

Almost everyone has an emotional moment related to work at some point - you're not alone. The key is to learn why you reacted that way and to focus not on the problem but HOW to resolve it. Another key component is to be aware of your emotional response so that you can learn to control it in the future in a calm way.

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**Question # 69**

If I talked to your three biggest fans, who would they be and why?

**Answer:-**

If you can reference three professionals with executive titles (CXO, VP, Director, Manager), that carries a lot of weight. Make sure you highlight how you've helped them achieve their biggest objectives and how that's made them your fan.

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**Question # 70**

Do you work well under pressure?

**Answer:-**

Yes.. When it comes down to the wire, the best thing I can to remain focused, have some flexibility, and understand priorities.. Giving them attention in the order they are needed.

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**Question # 71**

How do you think I rate as an interviewer?

**Answer:-**

I think you did fine. I'm sure you've conducted a lot of interviews, and it's probably second nature for you now. Thanks for taking the time to meet with me today. I'm sure you have a lot of things you have to juggle every day.

I'd say you rate at least ten out of ten. The questions you asked seemed spot on. I can tell you guys are working hard to find the perfect applicant for the job. I'm glad I could meet with you.

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**Question # 72**

What features of your previous jobs have you disliked?

**Answer:-**

It's easy to talk about what you liked about your job in an interview, but you need to be careful when responding to questions about the downsides of your last position. When you're asked at a job interview about what you didn't like about your previous job, try not to be too negative. You don't want the interviewer to think that you'll speak negatively about this job or the company should you eventually decide to move on after they have hired you.

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**Question # 73**



If you had to choose one, would you consider yourself a big-picture person or a detail-oriented person?

**Answer:-**

Both are important. You need to stress that. However, if you could only choose one, ask yourself In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission) - do you like to be "in the weeds" with your work, or do you want to be the one painting the vision?

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**Question # 74**

What is your greatest weakness In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)? What are you doing to improve it?

**Answer:-**

I believe my biggest weakness In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission) is wanting to help anyone I can help. What I mean is I am willing to take on task that are not my job. I want to learn all I can. However, that has helped me get promoted or even asked to help in times of need in other department. I have been know as the "go to person" when help is needed.

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**Question # 75**

Rate yourself on a scale of 10?

**Answer:-**

If you truly believe you're a 10, you better be able to explain why with examples / stories. If you believe you're a great contributor and have room to grow, say 8 or 9. If you're below that, explain what you would do to improve yourself to get the ranking you believe you can be.

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**Question # 76**

What techniques and tools do you use to keep yourself organized In TTC (Toronto Transit Commission)?

**Answer:-**

Utilizing a calendar, having a notebook with your "to do" list, focusing on your top 3 priorities each and every day, utilizing a systematic way of storing documents on your computer (like box.net)

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**Question # 77**

What do you think we could do better or differently?

**Answer:-**

This is a common one at startups. Hiring managers want to know that you not only have some background on the company, but that you're able to think critically about it and come to the table with new ideas. So, come with new ideas! What new features would you love to see? How could the company increase conversions? How could customer service be improved? You don't need to have the company's four-year strategy figured out, but do share your thoughts, and more importantly, show how your interests and expertise would lend themselves to the job.

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
